

2021–22 water and sewerage prices



What are the 2021–22 water and sewerage prices?

Icon Water owns and operates the water and sewerage assets and business in the ACT. The Independent Competition and Regulatory Commission (ICRC) has set the 2021–22 water and sewerage prices for the Capital region. From 1 July 2021, water and sewerage prices will be adjusted to account for the Consumer Price Index (CPI), market factors, and government charges.

For a typical household that uses 200 kilolitres of water per year, the 2021–22 pricing would mean a 2% increase to their combined water and sewerage bill, which roughly equals an additional 45 cents per week.

What does my Icon Water bill pay for?

Icon Water provides essential water and sewerage services that support the growth and prosperity of the Canberra region. Our core infrastructure and services include providing a secure water supply, high quality drinking water and environmentally sustainable water treatment.

Your bill helps Icon Water operate and maintain assets worth over \$2.6 billion, comprising the ACT's network of dams, water and sewage treatment plants, reservoirs, pumping stations, mains and more. It also helps us plan and build for the future, ensuring we can support the region with essential water and sewerage services.

For example, throughout 2021–22, Icon Water expects to spend more than \$22.1 million renewing the High Voltage Assets at Canberra's primary sewage treatment plant. This project will ensure sewage continues to be treated and disinfected in a safe and reliable manner before it's released back into the environment. We will also spend more than \$17.0 million upgrading the capacity of the Belconnen Trunk Sewer main to enable the sewer network to service Canberra's growing population. We support the growing Capital region, and supply high quality bulk water supplies to Queanbeyan community.

Importantly, we respect our role in protecting the environment. We have Australia's largest inland sewage treatment plant, treating to the highest standard so that environmental flows can be returned to the Murrumbidgee River system.

How are prices calculated?

The ACT has a two tier tariff structure for water consumption, and a water and a sewerage supply charge, shown below.

The ICRC regulates Icon Water's water and sewerage prices and made its latest five-year price direction for the 2018–23 period on 1 May 2018. During the pricing period, the ICRC makes adjustments in annual determinations, which take into consideration inflation and market factors.

The ICRC's Price Direction has allowed for measured and gradual rebalancing of tariffs, which will improve affordability while continuing to promote water conservation.

Consumption price structure:

Tier 1*	1 kL to 50 kL (consumption per quarter)	\$2.48/kL

A typical Canberra household uses 200 kL of water per year.

* Since individual customer's billing periods may be slightly shorter or longer than a calendar quarter, the Tier 1 price is applied to the first 0.548kL supplied on average per day of the billing period. The Tier 2 price is applied to water supplied in excess of 0.548kL on average per day of the billing period.

What are the Government charges that affect water and sewerage prices?

The Water Abstraction Charge (WAC) is a charge on those licensed to take water and is set by the ACT Government. The WAC is currently set at around 60 cents per kilolitre, which is charged to recover catchment management costs and environmental costs associated with water extraction. The Utilities Network Facilities Tax (UNFT) is an ACT Government charge on owners of utility network facilities, including electricity, water, sewerage, gas and telecommunications. As at March 2021, the UNFT is set at \$1,283 per kilometre of infrastructure. More information can be found at revenue.act.gov.au

Will the price of miscellaneous services increase?

Under the ICRC's Price Direction 2018-23, miscellaneous fees and charges have increased in line with inflation (1.8%) rounded to the nearest dollar.

What adjustments to charges can we expect next year?

The ICRC's Price Direction 2018–23 reflects the costs of providing clean, safe drinking water and reliable sewerage services to the ACT over this five year period.

Following the price reduction in 2018–19, the ICRC has determined that water and sewerage prices will change in line with inflation over the following four years.

What is the Utilities Concession?

The ACT Government is responsible for the Utilities Concessions Scheme. The Utilities Concession covers all utilities, including water and energy. The annual Utilities Concession is \$700 with payment applied to customers' electricity bills (not water bills).
